

DON'T FORGET... Entry Deadline is July 24 for Revenge of the Sequel

The clock is ticking, and the July 24 submission deadline for DRA's Revenge of the Sequel, the first of its kind art exhibition in the country, is just around the corner. Get in touch with your Muse(s), and let those creative juices flow for this juried, all-media art show, providing artists the opportunity to unleash their talents to create an image(s) that depicts and conveys their uninhibited and unabashed versions of a sequel. This is an open call to all artists everywhere.

If you haven't reviewed the call for entry, please go to either the DRA Web site at www.thedelrayartisans.org to download a copy, or stop by the gallery to pick up a copy, or contact the curator who will e-mail you a copy. We apologize for the call inadvertently being left out of last month's edition of TWCW. But we hope this doesn't stop you from submitting works for what is sure to be a fun, innovative, exciting, and saleable show.

As a reminder, although the show opens in September, the reason for the July 24 submission deadline is because the review of artwork is being done differently, and time is needed to complete this process. Artwork entered must be submitted on CDs, no slides, and must be received no later than close-of-business on Friday, July 24. Videographers should contact the curator before proceeding.

Entry fees are: DRA members, \$20; nonmembers, \$30. Artists may submit up to three images for the nonrefundable entry fee. If you want to submit more than three works, you may do so for an additional \$10 per image. Local artists, including DRA members, accepted are required to gallery sit during show dates (no exceptions). All artwork must be for sale. Show dates are September 4-27. Curator is David A. Volunteerism is Our Lifeblood By Linda Silk

Volunteerism is our lifeblood.... Ohm..... Volunteerism is our lifeblood.... Ohm..... That should be our new mantra. Sure, "Celebrating the art of making" is catchier, but it misses a key component of our success: We are **all** volunteers!

When members join DRA, they are asked to volunteer ten hours every year. How they volunteer is up to them—helping to maintain the gallery's award-winning gardens, writing press releases for upcoming shows, researching grant opportunities—or a multitude of other valuable activities. Ten hours isn't that big a commitment spread over a year; many spend more time each week watching television. When you consider that DRA provides a dynamic gallery where members can exhibit their art for less than any professional gallery in the region, this contribution by volunteers is what keeps our doors open. [Note: gallery sitting by exhibiting artists is a requirement for individuals participating in a show, and is not part of the ten-hour membership obligation.] *

Occasionally, I hear someone complain that they don't want to spend their free time volunteering to do the same thing they do in their day job. But that may be the best payment you could give the organization that promotes your artwork, provides creative fellowship, and enhances the quality of life to the community. Consider that what you do easily, another may struggle with. That might be the perfect task for you to volunteer.

The Del Ray Artisans membership application lists the following areas in need of volunteers: communications, fundraising, program organization, newsletter, grants, website, facilities, publicity, gardening, archives, administration, outreach, financial, and shows. If you can provide legal counsel, accounting/bookkeeping services, or data-entry/database maintenance, email me—DRA needs you! If you can hang shows, write grants, or spend one hour every month phone calling to line up food donations for the opening receptions—email me. I would be thrilled to get emails from all 300 of you wanting to volunteer!

But I am not the only one who wants to hear from you. In every newsletter, the directors of DRA are listed along with their email addresses, and each director oversees a committee that needs volunteers. Email them. Your participation will make us a stronger and more responsive organization so we can be celebrating the art of making for years to come.

- In lieu of sitting, work with the curator for an alternate volunteer assignment.
- If something prevents you from sitting on your assigned day/time, please immediately contact the show curator directly (via phone or email) to reschedule.
- Please do not leave any gallery sitting or other time-sensitive messages for the curator on the gallery answering machine or website.
- Members with gallery keys may be asked to open or close on multiple days.

Hair to Locks of Love; Over \$800 in Donations to Scholarship Fund

- Kathryn Brown, local photographer and member of the Del Ray Artisans
 (DRA), known in the Del Ray and local art communities for her long sweep
 of hair, worn past her waist since high school, has donated 14 inches of it to
 "Locks of Love." The donated hair will replace that lost by many disadvantaged children suffering from medical hair loss.
- Kathryn's friends and colleagues were invited to join the snipping on March 15 at the Del Ray Artisans gallery. She wanted support as she took this big step, as well as donations per inch of snipped hair. The per-inch donations are directed to the Del Ray Artisans' Ted Eichers Memorial Art Scholarship Fund. This fund provides an annual scholarship to a graduating T. C. Williams senior heading to college.

Kathryn shared her story with those gathered to offer support on the big day: "When I was growing up, my Mother cut our hair. I always wanted to grow my hair long, but Mother didn't want to take care of it, and she liked short hair. My hair was 'ram-rod' straight at a time when straight hair wasn't fashionable, so I was continually frustrated in trying to curl it.

"FINALLY, as a gift for my 8th grade graduation, Mother let me grow my hair! And the American counter-culture made long, straight hair the 'in' thing. For the first time in my life, my hair was the envy of all.

"Much as I loved her, I no longer trusted Mother to do any cutting, but I learned that my Dad liked long hair and was willing to take over the task. It became quite a bond between us, and after I left the roost, I could count on Dad to ask, 'When are we going to trim your hair?' whenever we visited. So my hair was kept healthy all these years.

"As the 'fad' of long hair became passé, I asked myself if I needed to cut mine. But I really had meant it when I had begged for long hair. I started to receive compliments from strangers, men and women, since long hair had become unusual. It became a mark of my individuality. So I kept it long for more years than I'm willing to say.

"I had actually begun cutting my Dad's hair in the last years of his life, making our bond even stronger. When my Father passed on at age 84 in 2006, my hair was no longer being trimmed. I started to wonder how long it would grow. When I was able to sit on it, it became, for the first time, a bother to me. But the thought of having anyone but my Dad trim my hair had become a very emotional one.

"Then a graduating high school senior with hair longer than mine told me that she was going to donate her hair to "Locks of Love". One could donate as little as 10 inches. This meant that I could donate mine, without having to have it cut short. This was now something that I could look forward to, rather than looking backwards, and I was ready.

"Theresa Kulstad, a fellow member of DRA, a friend, and a professional hair-dresser, was an obvious choice to do the cutting. She provides her services at no cost to persons donating their hair. When she proposed making an event of the act, it made my decision even easier. I could invite others to make monetary donations to a cause close to my heart, our Del Ray Artisans' Ted Eichers Memorial Art Scholarship Fund. Finally it was no longer about me!"

Theresa Kulstad, who did the cutting, reports: "Kathryn was both excited and nervous. I think that the audience actually helped her be brave. My experience has shown me over the years that there are those who truly agonize about getting haircuts and those who don't. Kathryn has an intense relationship with her hair.

"Her hair cut began to feel like an amputation to her once we measured nearly 16 inches from before to after. At one point, one audience member offered to double her ante if Kathryn went 2 more inches. But after considering it in the mirror, Kathryn realized that she couldn't go any further. Or as she put it, 'I have already reached my "Oh my God!" factor.'

"With the 'after' photos and the positive remarks on how youthful she looked, Kathryn embraced the fresh look and was soon swinging her hair around her shoulders with a beautiful smile. She has since been seen around town still smiling and swinging it."

The beneficiary of the over \$800 that has been raised is the Ted Eichers Memorial Art Scholarship Fund, which was established in 1998 by the Del Ray Artisans in honor of our former member and friend. Ted Eichers was an active DRA member. He grew up on a Minnesota farm, attended the University of Minnesota, served in the military, and worked at the Department of Agriculture for 29 years. Ted became interested in art after he retired and worked with wood veneers, creating scenes and compositions, which he exhibited at DRA. He proffered his art work and companionship to nursing home residents, inmates in jails and at-risk youth in Alexandria. He was a volunteer tutor with Alexandria and Arlington schools, as well as at shelters for the homeless and the Offender Aid and Restoration Program.

Since 2000, DRA has provided a scholarship to an art student graduating from T. C. Williams High School who is planning to attend college and continue his or her education in the art field. A committee of teachers selects the student best deserving of the scholarship. Each year the scholarship recipient is announced at the DRA-hosted Student Art Show, then presented with the scholarship by the Alexandria Scholarship Fund at their awards night, added to a memorial plaque which hangs at the DRA gallery, and given a one year membership in Del Ray Artisans.

DRA is happy to accept contributions, including memorial contributions, to the Ted Eichers Fund at any time. DRA is a 501 (c)(3) non-profit organization, and all contributions to DRA are tax deductible. Checks should be made out to Del Ray Artisans with a note of your wishes to add to this fund.
