#### Visionary Art

July 10-17; 10:45-12:15 pm.

Use everyday "stuff" to create what is particularly you. Peggy Kaufman is a professional artist who works in a wide variety of media. She sells her work locally and nationally.

#### Camera Arts

July 13-17; 1-2:30 pm.

Learn how to operate a 35 mm camera, compose and shoot great pictures, ten turn them into a group photo spread using digital imaging technology.

Britt Leckman is a professional photographer. He teaches photography and oversees a multi media lab at George Mason University.

Sessions begin July 13, 1998 with the exception of the Visionary Art class, which kicks off with a field trip to the Visionary Museum in Baltimore, MD, on July 10. Art Camp concludes Friday July 17th with a picnic and exhibit of works produced in each session. Transportation and materials will be provided by the Art Camp. #### MEMBERS PREPARE FOR BOTANICAL SHOW AT HISTORICAL RIVER FARM

The DRA will present a members-only exhibit at the American Horticultural Society's historic headquarters, "River Farm." The show will run from Aug. 3 to Sept. 18.

Artwork for the Botanical Art Show will be predominantly botanical, in other words, although people, animals, buildings, etc. can be included, the focus should pertain to plants or plant life (abstractions can be considered).

Co-curators Susan Dick and Kathryn Brown have decided that the theme will be the only limiting factor for this nonjuried show.

We must retain the right to choose works that fit our botanical hosts' requirements and our own selection criteria, but we have plenty of wonderful space to fill—so we welcome any and all 2-D and 3-D media from members.

The known history of River Farm extends back to the 1600's; it was even owned by George Washington, who (among other things) was one of America's first gardeners and horticulturalists! Two generations of his descendants lived there. It was almost owned by the Soviet Union in the 1970's, but instead became the headquarters of the American Horticultural Society in 1973. The main building, where the exhibit will wind through from the parlor to the ballroom, is an historical house, and the 25 acres of grounds include stunning gardens, and rolling hills that slope down to the Potomac River.

The house and gardens are open to visitors 9:00 to 5:00 weekdays, and the grounds are open weekends when not reserved for special events (10 miles south on the GW Parkway, call Sue Dick there weekdays, at 768-5700 x11, for directions and to check ahead). It would be easy to find inspiration to create new art in a stroll through their rich and colorful gardens!

We will be setting up dates for the drop off of artwork in the end of July. There will be no gallery sitting requirements, but there will of course be other opportunities to assist with the planning, hanging, opening as always... #### ART & LEARNING BLOOM IN CENTER'S GARDEN PROJECTS

Have you checked out the first installment of the landscaping at the Colasanto Center? The front area to the left of the entrance has been brightened by an attractive assortment of plants and shrubs. Bob and Mart Larson, Linda Silk, Susan Buchan, Ellyn Ferguson and Becky Heavner improved the soil and put in the plantings.

Larry Boyer donated his master gardener expertise and advice and Becky added labels for the plants. We're grateful to neighbor, Amy Slack, who donated large iris. We plan to expand the landscaping in the fall.

The Learning Garden is also underway across from the reccenter fence. Five children from G. W. middle school have joined the project so far—helping remove stones and grass from their plot, planting radishes, morning glories, melons and other vegetables.

Peggy Kaufman helped the young gardeners create pavers using cement, marbles, buttons, broken china and what they called "other riff-raff." She did a marvelous job and will hold a second session by popular request.

Members of the senior art class at the rec center will do a wet-on-wet watercolor session with the youth group. Another member has offered to do a session on bugs.

Sue Dick and Kathryn Brown located another excellent resource for us—Patrick Larkin, a well-known horticulturalist who directs programs at River Farm. He will work with the children on selecting plants appropriate to this area and plant care at the next session.

The Garden Committee would like to involve as many members of the DRA and outsiders who love to garden and/or work with children as possible. We envision spreading the effort so the many and varied skills among the artisans can be tapped. Although the Learning Garden group meets on Wed. afternoons from 3:30 to 4:30, other activities could be added on Saturdays, such as attending classes for middle school age children at sites such as Green Springs or field trips to gather vegetables to make still life paintings.

We need volunteers:

- to sign up for one week during June, July or August to water the two garden plots and to keep down weeds in the landscaped area
- to think about what kinds of arts/crafts related activities you could do with the children and sign up for an hour on Wed. afternoons or suggest a Sat. you could help
- to report possible resources to Mart Larson or myself.

## IMPROVING SENIORS' ACCESS TO THE ARTS

The Alexandria Arts Forum (which DRA is a member of), Commission on Aging, Commission for the Arts, and the Mt. Vernon Recreation Ctr. announce a joint project to improve senior citizens' access to the Arts. A combined task force is identifying ways to increase the information seniors receive on cultural events, and working to lower transportation costs for seniors.

Alexandria's Yellow Cab has informed us that seniors receive a 10% discount on the purchase of a book of scrip, which can be used in lieu of cash, for cab fares and gratuities with them. The books are in denominations of \$5, and may be purchased at Yellow Cab's office, or by mail or telephone with a credit card. ## STUDENT ART SHOW: AN INSPIRATION

Editor's note: The following is an excerpt of an email that Mart Larson sent to Linda Silk, the show's curator, who couldn't attend the show's opening reception.

I thought it perfectly captured the inspiration of the evening and decided to reprint it here for your enjoyment.

The STUDENTART SHOW runs until June 28. Gallery hours are Saturdays from 10-4 and Sundays 12-4.

Dear Linda, We sang your praises all evening Friday. In fact, Patty Lewis spoke very eloquently about your vision for the show and encouraged everyone to read your story on their program. She thanked you personally and the Del Ray Artisans for the first class job. Here's what I can remember of how things went...

...Friday morning: Patty Lewis from TC Williams High School requested a list of the award winners so she could announce their names on the loud speaker at school and encourage them to attend

the reception...

...Friday evening: People starting dribbling in about 7pm. Judy Grumbacher arrived with the Scavenger Hunt pages. She and Alice Cannon spent hours writing the thing on Wed. and Judy prepared the sheets at school. They look good. What a great idea.

... By 7:45 we had people streaming in. Kids and their friends—

perhaps about 25 overall over the course of the night.

... About 8pm the food table was filled to overflowing with cheeses, a steaming pot of delicious chili, chewy brownies, some elegant black bean dip and garlic pita chips, and Ellyn Ferguson's amazing array of apple-nut empanadas dusted with powdered sugar and her delicious dip of sweet potato, corn, black beans, pineapple pieces and cumin all garnished with a pineapple crown of leaves. It was glorious. People chowed down and commented on what great food we had. Thanks to Mary Jo Long who organized the reception.

... The room was buzzing. Shortly after 8pm we called everyone over to the large part of the gallery for a brief ceremony. Kathryn made opening remarks about the judging process and how difficult it

was, but what a joy it was. At the end of her comments she talked about how the young artists certainly deserved our applause, and everyone broke into applause. Charlotte also spoke and was very complimentary of the students and also their teachers.

... Then Patty spoke about the show's process and how you had approached her and had been so meticulous in your preparations and

she thanked the Artisans and supported what we do.

...One other thing: I spoke with one teacher who told me how wonderful this experience had been for a particular student. She said he was very pleased that morning when she announced to the class that the piece he had entered was an award winner. About the time we were accepting artwork he was having trouble finishing a landscape he was working on, she encouraged him to finish and said she wanted to enter it. That was the piece that he won with. She said the recognition was a wonderful, wonderful thing for him.

...the very kind Charlotte and Alethea stayed and cleaned up along with Ellyn and Marlin and Kathryn. I love this group. You are a champ. This is the best attended show we have had since we've been at the new center. I know there were over 100 people.

Well put Mart. Thanks for capturing our many thanks to Linda Silk and all the members who worked hard to make the show a success for these young artists. Their work is amazing and thanks to Linda's vision, we can rest assured that the future will be filled with great art from these talented newcomers.
